



Aggregated Demographic and Services Provided Data for January – June 2023










Note: Demographic data for PBHUC partner schools were pulled from publicly available data on DESE's website. There was a total of 22 PBHUC partner schools. There were 13 elementary schools who were PBHUC partner schools (grades pre-K through 5th grade) though UP Academy in Dorchester includes grades pre-K - 8th grade and enrollment for 6 - 8th grade were included in the elementary school totals. There were 2 middle schools who were PBHUC partner schools (grades 6th - 8th). There were 7 high schools as PBHUC partners schools (grades 8th - 12th and post graduate students) though two high schools in Lynn include 6th - 8th graders and enrollment for these grades were included in the high school totals.


Gender Identity












Students Receiving Services Under the PBHUC Grant by Grade Level, PBHUC Program for January - June 2023



Note: A total of 155 students were referred and 136 received were screened in from January - June 2023. However, three students were referred and screened in twice across this time so 152 and 133 unique students were referred and screened in, respectively. "Received services under the grant" is defined as the number of students who were in screened in and received services by grant-funded staff or from the CBHC. Students may have received multiple types of services across multiple months and were counted once in each of those months.



Note: Students may have received multiple types of services across multiple months and were counted once in each of those months. A total of 155 students were referred and 136 received were screened in from January - June 2023 (20 in Weymouth and 38 in Randolph). However, three students were referred and screened in twice across this time so 152 and 133 unique students were referred and screened in, respectively. "Recommended for other services" is defined as the number of students who were screened in and who were recommended for services from another provider, organization, or agency (other than your CBHC or from the grant-funded staff). These services can include behavioral health services, social services, or other kinds of support services. "Screened out but received assistance" is defined as the number of students who were not screened in but received some sort of assistance from grant-funded staff. This assistance could include, for example, providing a pamphlet for a service, assistance for a family member but not the student, or providing them with a website for more information about a service.
